PROMOTION OF LIEUT. EGGERTON, R.N.

Press Association telegraphs—It was officiated at the Admiralty that Lieutenant Frank Grenville Eggerton, who was so grievously wounded by a shell at Ladysmith, has been promoted to be a Commander in the Royal Navy's Fleet for special service in the South Africa, the promotion to date November 3.

REINFORCEMENTS SENT OUT.

NEW SOUTH WALES' SECOND CONTINGENT.

Union Liner Sparton, which has been fitted as a hospital ship, arrived at Capetown on Saturday.

The Union Liner, Scot, will leave Capetown on Saturday next for South Africa with the 2nd Battalion Suffolk Regiment. She has sailed on the 18th inst. with the African mails, but at the request of the Government her departure has been anticipated. The same company's steamer, Greek, will leave next Saturday with the 1st Battalion Essex Regiment.

Union Liner Gorth leaves about the 13th inst. with men and horses.

Transport Idaho, with the 73rd Field Artillery detachment of the Army Medical Corps, men and horses, left Medway for South Africa while the transport, Wakooi, with Carabon board, sailed from Gravesend.

The second contingent of the New South Wales Contingent left to-day for South Africa. Immense enthusiasm prevailed. The Premier states that the Australian contingent of ten thousand strong is sent to South Africa.

Northumberland Fusiliers and 350 petty officers and seamen left Portsmouth to-day for Capetown, where they embark for Capetown. Had a hearty send-off both from the civilians and the ships in the harbour.

It is reported that the transport Rapidan, which sailed from Mersey on Wednesday with troops for the South Africa, including 500 men of the Army Service Corps besides stores and ammunition, is putting off for Holyhead this morning, having experienced yesterday's storm.

The Sydney telegraph reports that the Rapidan has been damaged that her fittings are damaged, and that the horses, which formed part of the cargo are being stowed. Three boats also are stove in, and the Rapidan is returning to Liverpool to be refitted.

Among the troops which left to-day for South Africa was a detachment of the Royal Marine Battalion, which took with it a 15-pounder field gun of the new type.
