THE RAILWAYS.

An Order in Council detailing the procedure to be adopted for the appointment of District Directors on the Board of the West and South Clare Railways was read, and it was decided to convene a special meeting for Thursday evening, to allect a committee of two to not with the Rural Council Committee in the matter.

THE FORTHCOMING SESSITION. With regard to the annual election to take place in January—four of the Councillors retiring by rotation—the Clerk read the Order of 1898
