The body was in an advanced state of decomposition. He had official intrustion that Captain John Mitchell was missing on the night of the 28th December lest, and from the appearance of the body and the photograph produced, he had no doubt but the body was that of the late Captain

Mr John F. Power stated that he knew Captain Mitchell, having met him for the first time on the 27th December tast. He walked up the quey with him, and advanced him 22. He appeared to be perfectly soher. He was about forty years of

Miss Depihan gave evidence that the deceased and the steward of the vessel had been in the publichouse of Mr Windrim some time in December.

Head Constable Feeney stated that on the 3rd January last he had a communication from Mr. Samuel Bell, of Glasgow, that his brother-in-law, Captain Mitchell, wa missing from his ship in Limerick. He had got a description of the deceased and also of the watch and chain which he wore. The identification of the body was completed by the number of the watch. There was no reason to suspect for inplay.

The Coroner pointed out that from the evidence

there appeared to be no doubt but the body was that of Captain Mitchell, whose death was due to accidental drowning.

The jury returned a verdict accordingly, and on the application of Hard Constable Feeney the Coroner directed that the watch and chain found on the body should be forwarded to Mr Bell, the deceased's brother-in-law.
