Mr Park, was an excellent business man, and his genial and courteous disposition made him extremely popular not only in business but in private life. The funeral took place at St Munchin's Church on Tuesday, and was attended by representatives of the various mercantile firms in the city.

ROBBERY FROM A PUBLICHOUSE TILL—It has been reported to the police that last evening the sum of £2 5s was taken from the till of a publichouse belonging to Mr Brawn, Wickham street. "SIR—I am directed to state that the Paying Orders, dated 1st November, for £150 8s 8d and £850 5s 5d, forwarded to the Bank of Ireland in repayment of Sanitary and Labourers Acts loan have been returned dishonoured. As £215 1s of the amount is now subject to penal interest from 1st November, I have to return the Paying Orders herewith, and to request that you will state when funds are available, in order that Receivable Orders may be sent for the amount due, including the charge for penal interest, for the total amount of which new Paying Orders should be issued.

In reply to a resolution passed by the Guardians on the subject of an overdraft, the Local Government Board wrote "that if the demand of the Guardians for the service of the period ended on the 30th September last has been satisfied in full by the County Council, the Local Government Board cannot sanction any further overdraft at interest."

The Clerk said that the County Council had paid its liability up to December. The District Council was at present in arrear to the amount £1,600.

After some discussion, it was decided to ask the Local Government Board to grant a loan at the ordinary rate of interest.
