With very deep regret we record the death of the Hon Stephen E Spring Rice, eldest son of Lord Monteagle, which took place on Saturday last at his Lordship's London residence, Carlyle Mansions, The young gentleman contracted fever on the voyage home from Australia (the completion of a tour round the world), and, despite the best medical skill and loving care of his family, he passed away on Saturday afternoon. The Hon Stephen Edmund Spring Rice was born on the 23rd July, 1877, and consequently had not reached his 23rd away on Saturday afternoon. Needless to say, the news of Mr Spring-Rice's death has plunged Foynes and the whole countryside into the deepest sorrow at the very premature and unexpected demise of one whom to know was to love and esteem. He had a brilliant course at Oxford, and had he lived, a distinguished career was in all human probability in store for him. In this country, as well as in London, the deepest sympathy is expressed with Lord and Lady Monteagle in their poignant grief.
