COMMISSIONS FOR ROYAL IRISH CON- STABULARY OFFICERS.

A letter has, it is understood, been received from the War Office offering four commissions in the 2nd battalion Royal Irish Rifles, 25th Africa, to young Royal Irish Constabulary officers. The selection will be in the Lord Lieutenant's hands, the conditions being that the officers should be unmarried, between 20 and 30 years of age, and medically fit for service abroad. Should the officers who volunteer object to transfer their services permanently to the line they would be accepted for either six months, or the period of the war.
