### FUNERAL OF THE LATE MB R. DE ROS ROSE.

The funeral of the late Mr R de Ros Rose, J.P. took place to-day, the remains being removed from his late residence, Ardhu, at ten o'clock for interment at Kilmurry graveyard. Although the hour was rather early, the attendance of County residents was extremely large, and the procession was representative of all classes, the deceased gentleman having enjoyed the widest popularity. Indeed Mr de Ros Rose's early death has awakened feelings of deep regret aminget the community, and his genial presence from the various local social functions which was always so welcome, will be sadly missed. At several points along the route to Kilmurry the cortege was considerably augmented by residents of the surrounding districts.
