the Government were still without news from Admiral Seymour or the Pekin Legations. He then read Rear-Admiral Bruce's telegram from Taku, and said they had no information as to the operations which may have since been undertaken, nor as to the terms of the ultimatum reported to have been delivered by the allied Powers before the attack on Taku.

Answering Mr William Johnston, who com-plained that steam trawlers worked within the three mile limit at Ardglass, County Down, and injured the herring fishery, and Mr Slavin, who complained that they destroyed mackerel nets on the Kerry coast.

Mr Horace Plunkert said his Department had no power to prohibit trawling, but the question of protecting Irish fisheries was being earnestly

considered.

Mr Burcher having asked whether the statement in Mr Coghill's letter, published in the Morning Post, on Friday, that Mr T P Gill's appointment was the result of a bargain between the Government and the Nationalist Party, was true

Mr Balfour said there was not a shadow of foundation for it.

Answering questions by McWm Johnson and Mr T P O'Connor, respecting the Youthful Offenders Bill,

The Home Secretary said he was unable to make any definite statement about the Bill at present, and the Government had come to no dicision as to the prospect of passing the measure with the whipping clause omitted.

The Heuse having gone into Committee on the

Housing of the Poor Bill,

MrJFX O'BRIEN moved that it should be extended to Ireland.

Mr CHAPLIN opposed, contending that in this country its purposes were sufficiently fulfilled by the Labourers' Cottage Act.

On a division, the amendment was defeated by

120 votes to 69.

The debate on the Bill lasted till near midnight, many new clauses being proposed, some of which were accepted by the Government and Dassed

It was then ordered to be reported.
