FATALITY IN THE CITY

Mr. Coroner DeCourcey held an inquest to-day into the circumstances connected with the death of a child, named Hary McLoughlin, three and a half years old, whose parents reside in the New Road and who succumbed to injuries received by being knocked down by a car in the New Road, John's Square, yesterday evening.

The driver of the car, a man named Thomas Daly in the employment of General Sadler, Planey, was shortly afterwards taken into custody by the John Street Police, but was subsequently

liberated.

Sergeant McGauran, John Street, conducted

the inquiry.

James O'Loughlin, father of the child, deposed be saw her last alive about ten minutes to three o'clock on yesterday, and did not see her again until about nine o'clock in the Morgue at Barrington's Hospital. He could not submit any evidence respecting the occurrence.

Mary Collopy, living at No 7 Curry lane, deposed she saw the child in the New Road, about two yards from the footpath. At this time witness saw a horse and car come from the direction of Cathedral Place, at a pretty fast pace. She next saw the child beneath the car, and the wheel pass over her head. The driver did not see the child under the car. He drove off after the occurrence unconcernedly.

To a Juror—The driver appeared to her to be sober. Continuing, witness said the driver was at the side of the car farthest from the wheel

that pressed over the deceased.

Thomas Dwyer stated he did not witness the accident, but pursued the driver of the car, after the occurrence. He pulled up after a little hesitancy, and witness told him go back and see if the child required a doctor. Daly, the driver, appeared to be sober. He went to Barrington's Hospital after the removal of the child.

Mary Collopy, in reply to the Coroner, said the

child di-d in her arms at the hospital.

Thomas Daly said he was driving past St John's Hospital out from Limer ck on yesterday evening. As he was c ming round the corner near the hospital he saw a number of children on the road. He was driving at a very moders to pace, and when he came opposite where the children were he was fully six yards from them. As he was passing a child ran across the horse, and before he could do anything, the child was knocked down by the horse. Witness did everything to avoid the accident. Some persons shouted after him to stop, which he did, and went to the hospital to see how the child was.

The jury returned a verdict of accidental death by being rolled over by a car, and attached no

blame whatever to the driver, Daly.
