#### DEATH OF MR. E. M'HUGH.

A Belfast telegram says:—The news has been received with regret of the death of Mr. Edward M'Hugh, M.P., in Margate. The deceased gentleman belonged to an old and respected family in Belfast, his father being the founder of the well-known firm of Messrs. B. and E. M'Hugh, drapers, Rosemary street. Mr. M'Hugh was born in 1846, and received his education at St. Joseph's, Clondalkin. In 1892 and 1895 he was returned as Nationalist member for South Armagh by large majorities. Latterly the decline in his health became more marked, and, to the sorrow of many personal friends, he succumbed as stated.

#### RUSSIAN EULOGY OF LORD SALISBURY.

Commenting upon the announcement that Lord Salisbury will not relinquish his control of Foreign Affairs during his holiday sojourn in the Vosges, the "St. Petersburg Herald" says:—"It is eminently satisfactory to have an authoritative assurance that the British Premier will, during his recuperative retreat in the Vosges, continue to conduct the Foreign Affairs of Her Majesty's Government. This assurance will, we venture to say, give as much satisfaction on this side of the British Channel as it does to Englishmen. Lord Salisbury enjoys all over the Continent, and in this country more especially, greater respect and confidence than have been accorded to any British statesman during the present generation. We make no reflection in saying this upon other English Ministers who have been temporarily entrusted with the Foreign Portfolio. The Queen does not command the services of any Minister who could, in a general knowledge of affairs, unrivalled experience, and in soundness of judgment, be described as the equal of Lord Salisbury. The British Premier and Foreign Secretary cannot transfer his functions, since he cannot transfer his personality."
