THE CHINESE CRISIS.

CHINESE TOWN CAPTURED.

A telegram from Taku of Sunday's date, says Chin-Hai has been captured by the allied forces, but the Boxers escaped. The whole of the town of Dulin has been burned. The Fort of Peitang was captured by a combined force of Russian, German, and French troops. Li Hung Chang has arrived at Tientsin and is to proceed to Peking in five days.

ANTI-CHRISTIAN DISTURBANCES.

Serious anti-Christian disturbances are reported from the Canton-Delta, and a French gunboat has proceeded thither.

FURTHER MASSACRES.

The Minister for Foreign Affairs at Paris has received from the French Minister at Peking a telegram, dated September 10th, via Taku, September 28th, in which the Minister states that he received telegrams from France very irregularly, and also with great delay. The message also announces the massacres of two Italian Bishops in Northern Shansi, of an Italian missionary, of a French Franciscan Father Bolate, of seven European Sisters, and several Protestant Ministers. It is stated that the governors of the province had their heads cut off in his presence in his judgment hall.

The Powers and China.

OUTLOOK PACIFIC.

The Daily Mail's Berlin correspondent telegraphing yesterday regarding the German circular to the Powers in favour of the punishment of the Boxer leaders prior to the institution of negotiations, says Great Britain is understood to be entirely in favour of the main principle, but to be considering the means of carrying this into effect.

The domineering fact of the situation at the present moment is the excellent understanding between Germany and Great Britain, an understanding which, based on the commercial aspect of the China question, is entirely creditable to both countries. The opinion is general that Lord Salisbury's diplomacy has been, and is of the utmost value, in the promotion of harmonious action among the allies, and while the end may not be yet as regards China, the international outlook is most pacific.

MORE MISSIONARIES KILLED.

The following cable from the Shanghai Office of the Inland Mission has been received in London—"Eleven missionaries killed at Sihcheo, Taining Yah Yang, in Shansi. They are probably Mr and Mrs Peat and two children; Misses F E and M R Nathan, Miss Edith Dobson, Miss E M Heysman, Miss Hurn, Mr A Woodroffe, and Mr D Barrat, all of China Inland Mission."

1,000 BOXERS KILLED.

A Shanghai despatch says that Li Hung Chang's troops have killed more than one thousand Boxers at Hang Chau.
