THE THIRD ANNUAL REPORT

The report was as follows:—
“We are very pleased to be able to state that the third annual report of our Association shows an increase of work done which is a proof of its utility. The figures are as follows in detail.

“Since the 20th of October, 1899, the Association have attended 774 new cases, continuing to visit those which remain open. The total number of visits per week is 100.

“The work of the Association has increased in proportion to the increase in the population, as stated in former reports, by the work of the Association, trained to the work by one of the Sisters of St. John's Hospital, and by the lady Kelly.

“The Ladies' Committee meets weekly to receive the reports of the honorary secretaries and to transact necessary business.

“The expenses of the Association include the salaries of two of the nurses (the Sisters receive no stipend), the purchase of supplies as are not supplied by the dispensary and adding to the lending store in order to meet the increased demand made on it for postage, etc.
