FATALITY IN WEST LIMERICK.

A FAITHFUL DOG.

Last week a very melancholy drowning fatality occurred in the Croagh river, some three miles distant from Ballingarry. It has aroused universal regret. A man named Henry McCarthy, aged 80 years, living alone in the townland of Adamswood, a life long and faithful servant of the late venerated Very Rev. John Meehan, Pastor of the United Parishes of Croagh and Kilfinny, proceeded to a well, some distance away, for a bucket of water. In doing so he had to cross the river, over which there was an improvised bridge placed. On returning with his burden over this dangerous construction it appears that the poor man accidentally fell in. His body swept away by the current of w which was much swollen at the current of water, owing to the recent heavy rains. The cause of death would probably have never been discovered only that a faithful dog which accompanied him seeing his old master struggling in the water jumped in and endeavoured to rescue him from a watery grave. In the praiseworthy but futile attempt the faithful warden brought to the bank the drowning man's hat and pieces of his clothing, which were recognised by the neighbours, whose suspicions being groused in consequence of he not returning home in due course, went in search of him. For several days the river was dragged for the unfortunate man's body in vain. At length on Friday evening it was found in the large pond adjacent to Clonshire mill, some two miles from where the old man fell in. An inquest has been held by Dr. T. H. Hannigan, Coroner for the district, and a verdict of accidental death by drowning was the result. The greatest regret is felt at the poor man's untimely end.
