SAD OCCURRENCE AT CROOM.

DEATH AFTER A FUNERAL.

We regret to announce the death of Mr. John
Conway, of Croom. Deceased, who belonged to a
respectable County Limerick family, came to Glin
on a visit to his son, Mr. John Conway, Clerk
Glin District School, about a fortnight ago, and
was in perfect health up to a week since, when he
caught a cold while attending a funeral in Glin.
Notwithstanding all that the best medical skill
could do to combat the acute pneumonia which
set in, deceased passed away peacefully on Sun-
day, fortified by the rites of his Church. The
imposing funeral cortege which on yesterday ac-
companied the remains to Foynes Railway
Station, en route to Crecora, the family burial
ground, where the interment took place, gave
evidence to the respect and sympathy felt by the
people of the district, and must have afforded
some consolation to the members of his family
and relatives who journeyed to Glin on this sad
occasion.
