

RECENT RAILWAY FATALITY.

ADJOURNED INQUEST.

Returned inquest relative to the death of P. Dwyer, an assistant guard of the Great Western Railway Company, who died at Limerick Terminus on the night of August 27, by being knocked down by the special train from Kerry, was resumed at the City Courthouse by Mr. Coroner and a jury. The inquest had been adjourned for further evidence from this day week.

Inspector Hetreed conducted the proceedings on behalf of the Police. Barrington, Solicitor, appeared for the deceased.

S. Gaffney, Solicitor, appeared for the Society of Railway Servants.

Mr. Hetreed said that one of the jury wanted information from a witness who was present in court on the occasion. He had his information which had been taken on and he now proposed to read it. He then informed of Thos. Brennan, of Rathreolina, County Mayo, who deposed that on September 17 he was at Limerick station, at 3.30 p.m. he went below the goods store for a cattle waggon; he saw a man out of the goods store and he asked him as Sweeney, the shunter, and the man said, "down that way"; he seemed to be in a great hurry and ran away; witness crossed and stood on the timber footway. A man passed him while he was standing, and he suddenly before it had all passed him. He saw lamps on the side of the train; witness said a man was killed; immediately after he saw the parties taking a man out of the train and leaving him up against the wall. As the place was very dark he did not know it was the same man who was run over by the train.

Mr. Coroner said the information of this man was thrown much light on the subject. Mr. Cotter, fireman on the engine, deposed that nothing till he heard the jerk; he saw the train stopping; witness got down off the engine and saw nothing; the driver went down to see what was wrong, and when he came back he told him there was a man knocked down.

Mr. Gaffney: The pilot engine was shunting on the other side—on his right side; I could not see well; the night was dark; he agreed to go down when he said he could not see a man yards off; he could not say if all the lights were lighting; he whistled coming under the engine; witness was never in this particular place before; he was a native of Cork; they left at 1 o'clock that morning, and got a rest at 5 o'clock where he was five hours off duty.

Mr. Barrington: The accident occurred at the corner of the goods' store where the signals are, don't know whether there is a lamp there, but that he had now the inquest.

DROWNING ACCIDENTS IN LIMERICK.

Yesterday at 1.30 o'clock Mr. Coroner DeCoursey and a jury held an inquest in the City Courthouse touching the death of a man, aged about 27, supposed to be a sailor belonging to the Naval Reserve, whose body was found on Tuesday in the mud at Arthur's Quay. The Police communicated with Kilrush and Ballybunion situated at either side of the lower Shannon, and also with other localities, but they have received no report of any man having been missing, and the only clue which the authorities have as to his identity is the name "J. Cunningham," found imprinted on the clothes worn by the deceased.

Evidence was given as to the finding of the body.

Dr. Shanahan deposed that death was due to drowning, and that the body had been but a short time in the water.

The jury found a verdict to the effect that deceased was found dead in the River Shannon on the 17th September, and that his death was caused by drowning, but how occasioned there was no evidence to show.

Head Constable Feeney said he desired to bring under notice the dilapidated condition of the morgue. It was in a very unkept state. The roof was falling asunder. Who ever was responsible for keeping the place in repair should look after it.

The Coroner remarked that several complaints had been made with regard to the matter.

Head Constable Feeney said it was not very nice for the city of Limerick, or any civilised place, to have a morgue like it.

ANOTHER VICTIM.

Late on Tuesday night another drowning accident occurred at the quays. It would appear that on that evening a fireman named John Lewis and another named John Scott took their discharge from the ss. "Cathcart," where they had been employed. They proceeded to the ss. "Seapoint," which is berthed at Mountkenett Quay, and the captain granted them a passage to Whitehaven. Lewis and Scott were perfectly sober and on good terms. After a short stay on board they went up town, and nothing further was heard of them till eleven o'clock, when John Murray, the second mate of the "Seapoint," heard a splash in the water. He at once got a light and placed it over the bow of the vessel, but could not see anyone in the water. Constable Concannon was immediately on the scene, and every effort made to locate the man, but without avail. At ten minutes to two yesterday morning the body was discovered in the water in a standing position, as if the poor fellow had got stuck in the mud. At the time of the accident, Scott was seen in the vicinity, and on being questioned by Sergeant M'Arce said that he knew nothing of the
