ment of a successor to the late Mr. Hogan was
adjourned for four weeks, and it was decided to
leave the Library in charge of Mrs. Hogan in the
meantime.

FUNERAL OF MR JOHN HOGAN.

The funeral of Mr. John Hogan, the late City
Librarian, took place yesterday, the remains
being removed from St. Michael's Roman Catholic
Church at three o'clock for interment at Mount
St. Laurence Cemetery. The cortege was of very
large dimensions, being representative of all
classes of the citizens, and testified to the high
esteem in which the deceased was held, and the
general regret which is felt at his demise. There
was a very large attendance of the members of
the Free Library Committee and Borough Coun-
cil. Alderman Gilligan, *locum tenens* for the
Mayor, accompanied by Alderman Joyce, M.P.;
Mr. Wm. M. Nolan, Town Clerk, and other Cor-
