## DEATH OF MR. JAMES HOLLY- WOOD.

Deep regret is felt by many friends at the very sad and unexpected demise, as the result of an attack of pneumonia, of Mr. James Holly- wood, general assistant in the ironmongery es- tablishment of Mr. T. Hassett. Mr. Hollywood had been connected with the trade for years, and proved himself an excellent business man, and of an invariably courteous and obliging disposition. It was only last week that he became ill, and he passed away on Thursday at his residence, New street, at the early age of 44 years. The hymn "When our heads are bowed with woe" was sung. The officiating clergy were the Rev. F. Langbridge, Rector of St. John's, and Rev. W. H. Swain, Curate of St. Michael's. The portion of Scripture associated with the service was read by Mr. James Alexander, a member of the Select Vestry and choir. As the coffin was being taken into the church "O Rest in the Lord" was played on the organ by Miss Switzer, and at the close of the service the solemn strains of "The Dead March in Saul" issued forth.
