CITY CATTLE DEALER'S SAD DEATH.

INQUEST THIS AFTERNOON.

This afternoon Mr. Coroner DeCoursey and a jury, of which Mr. Michael Minihan was foreman, held an inquest concerning the death of James Kerley, cattle-dealer, of Janeborough, Roxboro' Road, who died yesterday evening at his residence from the effects of poisoning. The deceased, who was 42 years of age, was well known in the city, and greatly respected.

District-Inspector Hetreed conducted the inquiry on the part of the Crown.

Mrs. Catherine Kerley, widow of the deceased, deposed that her husband rose yesterday morning at half-past five o'clock. There had been a seizure of his cattle. He went into the city at seven o'clock, saying when leaving that he would not be long. On his return about half an hour after he asked her for a drink of water and then went into the parlour. In ten minutes afterwards she heard him vomiting. She at once sent a car for his brother Denis, and Dr. Holmes was also sent for, and was in attendance in a short time. Her husband did not tell her anything, and she was not aware that he was in money troubles. Deceased's father, brother and sister had been in the Asylum. She stated that her husband was rather strange for the past few days.

Mr. George Trousdell, assistant in the drug department in the firm of Messrs J. and G. Boyd, deposed that on yesterday morning the deceased came to him immediately on his opening the shop and asked for a sixpenny bottle of butyr of antimony, and three ounces of arsenic. Deceased told him that he wanted it for scald on a cow. Witness knew the deceased well, and that he was a dealer in cattle.

Mr. C. H. Fitt, Sub-Sheriff, deposed that he went to see the deceased last evening. He found him in bed, and understood that he was suffering from the effects of poisoning. Witness asked him "why he had done this," and he replied "the wrong document at Bennis, I could not bear the scandal of it."

Dr. John Holmes said he found deceased suffering from symptoms of poisoning. He would not tell witness what the poison was, and witness asked Father Cregan to request the deceased to answer the question, and the deceased told Father Cregan that he had taken arsenic. He had all the symptoms of arsenical poisoning. Death was due to failure of the heart's action, caused by an overdose of arsenic. He understood that the deceased took the arsenic about 7 o'clock that morning, and he died at six o'clock in the evening. Death would ensue quicker after a larger dose. The vomiting caused him to get rid of a good deal of it. Two grains of arsenic would be sufficient to cause death.

Mr. Hetreed said he did not propose to give further evidence. They had the fact that deceased died from arsenical poisoning which was self-administered.

The Foreman mentioned that the deceased had a sister in the asylum at present.

The jury found that death was due to arsenical poisoning administered during insanity.

THE REVISION COURT

Mr. Richard J. Kelly, Revising Barrister, with Mr. Beauchamp, Clerk of the Court, continued the revision of the Parliamentary list at the County Courthouse. Several claimants from the Patrickswell division attending having satisfied his worship as to their qualifications, were admitted.

John Bourke, Ballyvillogue, proved as an inhabitant occupier and got the claimant stated that he had received from Lord Emly to attend and prove his qualifications.

The Barrister—As the law at present persons are not paid for proving their vote.
