 to the German methods of warfare may have been
 there is no justification whatever for the absurd
 and hysterical outbreak on the part of the German
 people and the German press—which, indeed, may
 be unmistakably traced to the machinations of
 the unspeakable Dr. Leyds and his associates.
 Some idea of the methods, in the Franco-German
 War at any rate, may be gathered from the ac-
 count of Sedan, given by Mr. Charles Lowe, the
 well-known war correspondent. As Mr. Lowe was
 a personal friend of Prince Bismarck, he is not
 likely to have exaggerated the facts against the
 German Army—

The German cannonade increased in deadly
 violence. Fires burst out, women, children, and
 wounded were destroyed, and the air was filled
 with shrieks, curses, and groans.

The King ordered the whole available artillery
 to concentrate a crushing fire on Sedan, crowded
 as it was with fugitives and troops, so as to bring
 the enemy to their senses as soon as possible, no
 matter by what amount of carnage.
