DEATH OF REV. DR. MOLONEY, P.P., V.G.

The Very Rev. Dr. Moloney, P.P., V.G., Rathkeale, died at ten o'clock this morning at the parochial residence, Rathkeale, after a short illness. The deceased clergyman, who was in his seventy-eighth year, was a favourite with all classes, and his somewhat unexpected demise is deeply mourned. He had been for seven years in charge of Rathkeale parish, and was previously parish priest of St. Munchin's, Limerick. Office and High Mass will be celebrated on Saturday, immediately after which the interment will take place in St. Mary's Church, Rathkeale.

ANDY HEHIR

GETS TWELVE MONTHS' IMPRISONMENT.

At a full bench of magistrates at Corofin to-day Andy Hehir was charged with having failed to comply with the conditions of his ticket-of-leave and also with assault on Mr. T. Flanigan, J.P., Chairman of the District Council.

Mr. Flanigan said that he had been struck by Andy with a stick, and that he drew a revolver on him.

Andy was sent to prison for his unexpired term of three weeks, and to a further period of twelve months on the charge of assault.

THE CARPENTERS' STRIKE.

At the Police Court this morning, before Mr. Hall, William Shine, a carpenter, was charged by the police with drunkenness. It appeared that last night, about a quarter past eleven, Shine was passing along by the building in Pery-street where the imported carpenters are residing, and shoved his hand through a window. In doing so he injured his hand severely, and Head Constable Feeney had him sent to Barrington's Hospital, where his wounds were dressed. Mr. Hall fined him 10s. 6d., which he declined to pay, and was sent to gaol for fourteen days.

LIMERICK FISHERY

THE REDUCTION OF FINES—STRENGTHENED.

The monthly meeting of the Limerick Board was held to-day. The members were:—Mr. Whatley Ellis, J.P. (president), Mr. Hall, J.P.; Alderman McDonnell, Place, Mr. P. McInerney, Mr. T. McPatrick, Mr. McAuliffe, Mr. Francis McAuliffe, Mr. Hosford, Secretary, and Mr. Hosford, Inspector, were in attendance.

SUBSCRIPTION FROM BOARD OF WORKS.—The following was received from Public Works, dated October 10th—

"SIR—With reference to your letter of the 4th April, and subsequent correspondence for a contribution from the Board towards the expenses of the Limerick Conservators of the Works directed by the Commissioner of Public Works to state that the Lords of His Majesty's Treasury have been sanctioned an annual subscription of £100,000 for this and the following year on condition that the Board are satisfied that special attention is being given by the Conservators to all matters relating to the works. For this purpose a full record should be kept of the Conservators of all action taken. On the expiration of the year the whole question will be reconsidered. Mr. Hall remarked that they would be glad to see the money."

Mr. Hosford said before receiving the communication he was required by the Board to furnish them with particular cost of special bailiffs engaged at Limerick and Killaloe for the past two years.

Mr. Place: At any rate it is well worth the money.

ILLEGAL FISHING ON THE SHANNON.—A letter was read from the Limerick Board stating "that the question of the opening of the weekly close season in the Limerick district, and the prevention of illegal fishing on the Lower Shannon, referred to in your letter of 22nd August last, must be considered in connection with other applications of a similar character that have been received from the district. No definite reply to your letter can therefore be given at present."

THE REDUCTION OF FINES—STRENGTHENED.—Mr. Hosford said he had to bring notice of the Conservators a matter of the utmost importance to them. Since there were some prosecutions brought against parties residing in the district of Ballyunion for illegal fishing on the Lower Shannon, notice was known to have been in effect very long time, and eventually, at a great expense and great trouble, the Board succeeded in detecting these parties. They were prosecuted at Petty Sessions.

Mr. Hall: I was in Ballyunion for some time and I heard queer things about illegal fishing. Mr. Hosford: After taking special notice of the offenders Mr. Hall, succeeded.

Mr. Ambrose Hall: He had a fine of 10s.

Mr. Hosford: A very difficult and dangerous one. The defendants were each fined 10s. They immediately memorialized the Lieutenant, and the result was committal. Two of the parties were fined
