DEATH OF REV. DR. MOLONEY. P.P., V.G.

The Very Rev. Dr. Moloney, P.P., V.G., Rathkeele, died at ten o'clock this morning at the parochial residence, Rathkeele, after a short illness. The deceased clergyman, who was in his seventy-eighth year, was a favourite with all classes, and his somewhat unexpected demise is deeply mourned. He had been for seven years in charge of Rathieule parish, and was previously parish priest of St. Munchin's, Limerick. Office and High Mass will be celebrated on Saturday, immediately after which the interment will take place in St. Mary's Church, Rathkeale.
