LICENSING PROSECUTIONS.

At the Newcastle West Petty Sessions on Friday, before the Hon. John Ffrench, R.M., President, James Hogan, Thomas Hurley, and Patrick Shaughnessy.

Head Constable O'Doherty charged Mr. Nelson with a breach of the licensing law on the 12th inst.

Mr. John Condon, solicitor, defended.

The Head Constable deposed that about ten minutes past ten o'clock on the night of the 12th, saw three men leaving the defendant's public use, and the door closed after them. He locked, and was admitted by the defendant, and found three men in the "snug," and three opposite the bar with drinks before them. None of them denied having the drink at all, and even drank it before him.

Mr. Condon said these young men, most respectable young men, after their walk turned in before 10 o'clock for bottles of porter and were only finishing their drink when the Head Constable came in. There was no drink called for or paid for after 10 o'clock.

The case was dismissed.

Sergeant O'Brien charged Michael Murphy with similar offence.

Mr. J. Condon, solicitor, defended.

Sergeant O'Brien stated that on Sunday, 17th inst., he found fresh traces of drink about the top counter, and John Dwyer, Timothy Sullivan and Patrick Hannan were on the back portion of the licensed premises.

The defence was that the men were card playing in the hall.

A fine of 20s. and 5s. each on the three defendants was imposed.
