## THE SHOCKING STREET FATALITY.

Mr Coroner DeCourcy, held an inquest yesterday  
on the body of James Enright, Athlunkard street,  
aged 61 years, who was killed the previous after-  
noon in George street by a runaway horse.  
Sergeant Murray, Edward street, conducted the  
inquiry on behalf of the police.

Evidence as to the purely accidental nature of  
the occurrence having been given,

Dr. M'Grath, Resident Surgeon, Barrington's  
Hospital, deposed that deceased only lived for a  
few minutes after being brought to hospital. The  
injuries were so numerous and so severe that death  
would as a consequence follow shortly after the  
occurrence.

The Jury returned a verdict that deceased met  
his death through injuries sustained accidentally.

The driver of the cart who was thrown during  
the progress of the runaway animal, is detained  
in hospital owing to his injuries.

## LIMERICK FARMER'S SAD DEATH.
