AUDITOR'S REPORT.

In his report the Local Government Board Auditor pointed out that the collection of the cot-tage rents does not show any decided improvement on the previous half-year, and especially in Mr. O'Conner's district, where the arears are Mr. O'Connor's district, where the arears are altogether too high. In connection with the costs of the 6th scheme for labourers' cottages, vonchers for payment to witnesses were not produced, and I have held over the paying forder for their production. The books of this Council are not attresent being kept efficiently written up, as the two assistants who were employed on this duty have refused to contain the work. They state that they are not atmosphered by the Council and have received no remuneration. The Council should without delay take steps to have their books tept written up to date. said the books were written up and accounts

SEVENTH SCHEME.—INSPECTOR'S REPORT.
The Local Government Board wrote forwarding copy of the report of their inspector, Mr. Wilson Lynch, relative to the local inqui y held by him Lynch, relative to the local inqui y held by him into the Improvement Scheme made by the Limerick No. I Rural District Council under the Lacourers Act, which proposed to provide 246 cottages, and to acquire 306 additional allotments to be let to the tenants of existing cottages.

The Inspector reported that two of the cottages

reported in the table as having been recommended in Clarina division are to be built on alternative the Case which are in Carrig Electoral Division, but the cases have been retained in Clarina to avoid confusion. Of the 123 cases of cottages not recommended, 35 were withdrawn; in 28 the applicants were living in houses not condemned by a madical office; of health; in 19 the holdings in which the sites were proposed was to come! a madical omicer of nearen; in 19 the holdings in which the sites were proposed were too small; in 8 the applicants were not agricultural labourers, and in 7 they were dead or had left the district. Of the 58 cases of additional allotments not fee. on mended, 8 were were withdrawn; in 26the applicants kept their premises or plots in a state of filth or neglect, and in 7 the applicants do not appear to have been agricultural abourers. The Inspector recommended sanction to the provision Inspector recommended sanction to the provision of 123 cottages, and the acquisition of 248 additional allotment tional allotments

Mr. Ryun (Khockatane) suggested that the schedules should be printed and sent round to the Guardians so that they could understand the reasons for those cortages which were rejected.

He asked the Council to direct the Clerk to communicate with the owners and see if they were willing to give up the plets, in which event the labourers would pay con-acce rent until such time as the owners of the land were compensated by the

In the discussion it was stated that several of the farmers were willing to give the land to the labourers.

Mr. John Lynch proposed that in the cases of consents, the Engineer be empowered to lay out

the plots without unnecessary delay. Mr. O'Malley said that could only apply to the additional half acre.

The resolution was passed on these conditions.
