FOUND DROWNED.

Yesterday afternoon the body of a man was
found in the Dock after the departure of the
Garryowen from her berth. It is supposed by the
police that the remains are those of a sailor named
Fritz Wessels, a native of Hamburg, who was
missed from the ss Littleton on the night of March
21st. Wessels was described as a man of about
25 years of age, 5 feet 5 inches in height, stoutly
built, and the body corresponds to this description.
Information having been brought to Constable
Clin at the Dock Police Station, Sergeant M'Arce
got the body taken from the water and removed
in charge of Constable O'Brien to the Morgue.
An inquest was held last evening by Mr.
Coroner DeCourcy and a jury, and a verdict of ac-
cidental death from drowning was returned.
