A woman has entered Sheffield Workhouse with over £175 in her possession.

Lord Dufferin passed a fairly good night and appears slightly easier to-day, but his condition remains critical.

The anniversary of the death of Pope Pius IX was commemorated yesterday by a special Mass in the Sistine Chapel.

Dalziel says that Lord Rosslyn's second visit to the gaming tables at Monte Carlo has proved disastrous; all his capital has been lost.

Seven fresh cases of small-pox were notified in London on Thursday morning. There were 1,138 patients under treatment last night.

According to the "Lokelanzeiger," the Tsar has invited the Emperor William while at Danzig to visit him while in Russia.

The Yarmouth magistrates have held that the use of a decoy bird by bird-catchers is illegal under the Wild Birds in Captivity Act.

In well-informed circles there is believed to be good foundation for a report that a new Turkish conversion scheme is under consideration.

The Cork and Macroom Railway dividend, declared yesterday, is 5 per cent. on the Preference shares, and 2½ per cent. on the Ordinary shares.

The Italian revenue receipts for the first current financial year exceed by twenty million lire those for the corresponding period last year.

On Tuesday two hounds belonging to the Carbery pack, of which Mr. Beamish, M.F.H., is the owner, were poisoned while the Carbery Club were hunting.

Two discoveries have been made on the beach near Victoria, B.C., which are believed and taken as a further proof that the missing Condor has foundered.

Ontario manufacturers are about to establish sample rooms in London. The Dominion Government will aid the enterprise to the extent of five thousand dollars yearly.

A band of robbers blew open the safe of a bank at Clarksville, Arizona, and secured 6,000 dollars. They got safely away after killing the sheriff of the county.

On the second day of the sale of the Wiltoughby porcelain, a Sevres dessert service was knocked down for 3,200 guineas, and the total proceeds were £20,578 11s.

Mr. James Clarke, an actor, has recovered twelve guineas damages sustained by reason of drinking a concoction of soda, soap suds, etc., instead of stout and bitter asked for by him at a Strand hotel.

The Corporation of Sligo is in a bad way. Although they have struck the maximum rate allowed by law, and have reduced the salary of the Mayor from £400 to £200, there is still in prospect of substantial deficiency.

DEATH OF DR. BARRY.

We announce with very sincere regret the death of a highly respected and prominent citizen Dr. Robert Barry, M.D., which took place at his residence, the Crescent, at about nine o'clock this morning. The sad event was most unexpected by the public, though it was known that the Doctor had been in ill-health for some time past. Universal regret prevails in the city at the premature demise of a most popular gentleman, an eminent member of his profession, and a true and warm-hearted friend of the poor. Dr. Barry, who was something over fifty years of age, was the son of an old Limerick man, Mr. John Barry, his mother being a Cork lady. He had a distinguished collegiate career, and held various professional degrees—viz., M.D. of the Royal University of Ireland, '83; F.R.C.S.I., '82; Lic., '70; L.M., '70; L.A.H., Dublin, '71; Diploma of Sanitary Science, R.U.I., '85; 1st Prizeman in Chemistry, Ledwich School; and Fellow of the Academy of Medicine (Ireland). He held various public appointments during his time, those which he occupied up to the time of his demise being Superintendent Medical Officer of Health under the Borough Council; Consulting Physician to Limerick Union, and local doctor to the Railway employees. Dr. Barry had also been an Inspector in connection with the Royal University examinations. He was a deeply-read man, and it may be added that he was passionately fond of music, and of the drama in a lesser degree. He was characteristic for his unvarying courtesy and unassuming manner, and, as we have said, for his noble qualities of head and heart. The deepest sympathy is expressed with Mrs. Barry and family in their great sorrow. Dr. Barry was brother-in-law of Mr. M. A. Heanessy, C.E., of Cork, and formerly of Limerick.
