REMARKABLE LIVING CENTENARIAN.

Our Abbeyfeale correspondent says :- Mrs. Ellen Reidy, who still resides at Old Chapel street, Abbeyfeale, is one of those whose interesting reminiscences range from the early part of the last century. Born in the year before the '98 rebellion her memory still retains impressions of many striking historical events which occurred shortly afterwards. Her recollections of the exploits of Captain Rock, the leader of the Rockites n 1819, whose headquarters were situate in the then unfrequented slopes of the Cratice mountains of West Limerick, and the White Boy raids of '21 and '22 are still vividly clear. Incidents connected with the part taken by West Limerick in the '48 movement are also indelibly fixed in her memory.
