## THE GLIN TRAGEDY.

### CHARGE OF MURDER.

To-day, before Mr. Hickson, R.M., two young men named Michael and James Normoyle, farmers' sons, were charged with causing the death of John Dillane at Glin on the 14th instant. The evidence given at the coroner's inquest went to show that Dillane's house was attacked with stones on the 25th September, and that one of the missiles struck and fractured deceased's leg, the allegation being that death resulted from the wound. Mr. Wm. Leahy, Crown Solicitor, appeared to prosecute.

On the information of District Inspector Cusack, Rathkeale, the accused were remanded for eight days.

## COUNTY PETTY SESSIONS.

These sessions were held to-day, before Mr. E. F. Hickson, R.M. (presiding), Dr. O'Shaughnessy, D.L., and Mr. B. O'Donnell.

### A DANGEROUS OFFENCE.

Sergeant McGauren (Ballinacurra) summoned Luke O'Shaughnessy for being drunk while in charge of a horse and cart.

Mr. Hickson said the offence was a serious one and most dangerous to the public. Defendant would be fined 10s. 6d. and costs.

John Bartley, charged by Sergeant Green (Ballysimon) with a like offence, received a similar penalty.

### ALLEGED ASSAULT ON A BROTHER.

The case in which a young man named Flanagan was charged with assaulting his brother and with using a knife was gone into. The circumstances showed that defendant happened to be pointing a stick at the time. The brother swore that the occurrence was purely accidental, both being always on the best of terms.

The magistrates refused informations. Mr. O'Hara, D.L., prosecuted, and Mr. Gaffney appeared for the defence.

### MILITIAMAN IN TROUBLE.

John Hayes, a militiaman, was charged by Acting-sergeant O'Connor (Fedamore) with breaking into a house with intent to commit a felony.

Accused was remanded to Ballyneety Petty Sessions, bail being measured at £20 sureties, and a personal guarantee of £40.

At the Old Bailey yesterday Thomas Fairclough Barrow, 49, labourer, was sentenced to death for the murder of Emily Barrow, 32, who passed as his stepdaughter.

The London "Express" says—General Delarey states that General Botha and himself will join Mr. Chamberlain in South Africa early next month.

The remains of Prince Edward of Saxe Weimar were conveyed to the Victoria Station, en route for Chichester with full military honours. Lord Roberts attended.

The King of Sweden in his award in the Samoan arbitration case, adopted a view favourable to the German claims. The amount of damages is reserved.

At the Seville Cathedral on Monday the ceremony of depositing the ashes of Christopher Columbus in a special mausoleum was carried out with due solemnity.

A Mexboro telegram states that the Thryberg Hall miners, who have been out of work 11 weeks, have decided to resume on the company's offer.

It is reported that Mr. John W. Gates, of Chicago, has organised a Corn in May corn. His agents are buying up corn right throughout the west.

It is officially announced that telephonic communication between Rome and Paris will be opened early in December. The line covering 1,200 miles is the longest in Europe.

Tuesday was the birthday of Lieutenant-General Sir William Butler, K.C.B., who was born in Tipperary in 1837. He entered the 69th Regiment in 1858, and has seen much active service.

The London Court of Appeal yesterday dismissed the application of the Columbus Co. for a new trial of the action brought against Mr. Labouchere and another in which judgment had been entered for the defendants, with costs.

Colonel Tennochy's column has captured the enemy's stronghold on the Indian frontier. Captain White, 3rd Sikhs, was killed and three officers and six men wounded. Colonel Macrae has captured 250 of the enemy.

An unknown incendiary was the cause of total destruction of the East End Farm, Furneaux, Pelton, North, yesterday morning. The farm was fired in two places, and with it were burnt 62 head of swine, 150 turkeys, 100 fowls, four horses, two cows, and a calf.

After three years' trial the Admiralty has adopted the life invented by Captain Pett, a deputy harbour master at Dover, which enables ships' boats to be simultaneously released from the tackle without the possibility of the boat capsizing.

In the House of Commons, answering a demand for Irish-speaking magistrates and Postmasters, Mr. Wyndham said that applications and recommendations for the Commission of the Peace are made to the respective Lieutenants of the counties.
