

At the next meeting of the Corporation, Mr. Kelly will move—"That the resolution passed at last meeting, removing the sale of horses from the streets to the Fair Green be rescinded, and that the sales be continued on the streets as heretofore."

The question of costs appear to be the chief bar to a settlement between the Ellis tenants and their landlord, and this not having been removed at the last meeting of the tenants, it is expected the agent will place the decrees for ejectment for final execution with the sheriff immediately.

A large disused mill has been taken in Dunleer, Co. Louth, for the storage and malting of barley. Already a large number of farmers of that district are sending in their corn, which obtains a ready and profitable market. The barley is intended for the Dublin brewers and distillers.

The death is announced of Mr. Francis Prittie Tydd, solicitor, at his residence, Bighton-place, Clonmel, aged 84 years. He was one of the oldest and most honoured inhabitants, and enjoyed the respect and good will of every class of the community, while the same feeling of kindly regard was entertained for him within a far wider sphere.

The Land and Labour Association of Kilrush, which since last Urban Council election time stood adjourned, was revived on Sunday night as a result of a public meeting of the labour classes, over which Mr. Thomas Boughan, U.C.C. presided. The funeral took place yesterday and was very largely attended.

At a meeting held on Sunday night, Mr. M. O'Shea in the chair, the re-organization of the Kilrush Dramatic Club was effected. It was unanimously decided to hand over the proceeds from the opening performances to the local football body to assist in the purchase outright of the grounds held by that club.

An "Old Timer" writes: "DEAR SIR,—In reading the interesting article on Steeplechasing, in the *Chronicle* of 15th inst., I was surprised to find that in the part headed 'Famous Horses and Riders' there was no mention of John Preston's famous mare, Brunette, and her rider, Allam McDonagh, who won the Grand National three times; Brunette had never been raced on the flat, and had been regularly hunted for many years by her owner, who was a heavy weight. She was said to be 13 years of age when she won the Grand National for the third time. I think there must be several old-timers in Limerick who remember seeing Allam McDonough's performances on the old Newcastle course, and his short, quick step and slight limp were well known in the streets of Limerick. Brunette and he were really attached to each other, she would follow him like a dog, and he never struck her in her life, nor did her owner. Another remarkable horse which I was surprised to see omitted from an article of the kind in a Limerick paper was the Lamb, who much more recently won the G and National three times, and who was bred in the county, as was her dam, Erin's Pride, by Barry's Arthur. In the old steeplechase the riders did not make a bee line for the steeple close to which the winning post was placed. They took any line they liked, so as to utilise their knowledge of the ground and their horses capabilities.

DEATH OF MR. THOMAS KELLY.

We regret to announce the death of Mr. Thomas Kelly, which took place at his residence, 5, Mount Vincent Cottages, yesterday. Mr. Kelly belonged to an old and highly respectable Limerick family, and was held in much esteem by all who knew him. He was for many years Governor of Limerick City Prison, and retired when the present arrangement was made, by which the City Prison became the Female Prison for City and County. He had reached a good age, and although his health for some time past had not been robust, the news that he had passed away yesterday was somewhat of a surprise to his friends: The deepest sympathy is felt for his widow, whose devoted care of Mr. Kelly in his declining years is beyond all praise. The remains were removed this evening to St. Michael's Roman Catholic Church, from which the funeral will take place to St. Lawrence's Cemetery to-morrow.

EMIGRATION AND CONSUMPTION.

According to the returns obtained by the Royal Irish Constabulary and the Metropolitan Police, who acted as enumerators at the several Irish seaports, the number of emigrants who left Ireland during the quarter ended 30th September, last, was 11,469 (4,962 males and 6,507 females), being 1,315 more than in the corresponding quarter of the year 1901 and 932 over the average number for the third quarter of the ten years 1892-1902. The Registrar-General has the following remarkable note in his Quarterly Health return:—As affecting the public health of this district, I wish to point out that the return of young people (who had emigrated to America) suffering from tubercular disease of lungs must necessarily tend to the spread of the disease at home. Phthisis is acquired mostly by those emigrants who have been in domestic service (girls), though no family predisposition to the disease at home can be noted as a causative factor of phthisis. Possibly this also occurs in other districts.
