LIMERICK CHAMBER OF COMMERCE

AND THE PROPOSED LAND CONFERENCE.

A special meeting of the Limerick Chamber of Commerce was held to-day for the purpose of considering the desirability of supporting the proposed Land Conference. Mr. A. W. Shaw, J.P., President, occupied the chair. There were also present—Sir Thomas Cleve, J.P.; Mr. W. L. Stokes, J.P.; Mr. William Lloyd, Mr. J. Ellis Goodbody, Mr. R. Plummer, Mr. J. H. Roche, J.P.; Mr. John Dundon, solicitor; Mr. R. Roche, Secretary County Council; Mr. J. F. Power, Mr. A. J. Eakin, Mr. J. Egan, Mr. M. Cusack, Mr. John Boyd, Hon. Secretary.

The President having explained the object of the meeting, and the subject having been discussed,

The following resolution, proposed by Mr. W. L. Stokes, seconded by Sir Thomas Cleve, was unanimously adopted:—"Resolved—That we, the members of the Limerick Chamber of Commerce, recognising that a final settlement of the land question would materially benefit the trade and commerce of this county and city, as well as tend to the general prosperity of the country, and believing that a solution of this difficulty can be brought about by means of a conference held between the representatives of the owners on the one hand, and of the agricultural tenants on the other, would respectfully urge on all interested in this question to use every effort in their power to bring about this result, and also would impress on the Chambers of Commerce in Ireland the advisability of taking similar action, and by their influence endeavour to effect the object of this resolution."

position. The building itself, it was hoped, in its architectural treatment, would be an ornament to the city, and a fitting memorial to their munificent benefactor. The Committee earnestly hoped that Lord Limerick might be prepared to look favourably on the proposal to place the building in the Park. The report was signed by the Mayor, Father Lee, and Mr. Lynch.

Rev. James Dowd remarked that they could do nothing till they got Lord Limerick's reply.

The Town Clerk said he understood Mr. Barrington was away.

The Committee were largely in favour of the People's Park site, while one or two other sites were also discussed.

After some discussion the matter was adjourned pending a reply from Lord Limerick, a special meeting of the Committee to be then called.
