NEARING PEACE.

The *Daily Mail* says—All the leading Boer Generals are now engaged on the question of peace. No formal proposals have yet been made to the British Government, but we believe that an important announcement is likely to be made in the course of a few days. The two points upon which no concession can be made are the abolition of Boer independence and a general laying down of arms. Everything else can be made the subject of negotiation. There is a most hopeful feeling in well-informed circles.
