## THE REVENUE OF WESTERN AUSTRALIA.

The revenue of Western Australia for the last month amounted to £320,739, being an increase of £51,391 compared with December, 1900. Commonwealth collected £124,393 of the total, and State £196,346.

A destructive fire broke out on Thursday in the Shrigley Spinning Mills, near Killyleagh, Co. Down, belonging to Mr. John Martin, and property valued at over three thousand pounds was destroyed.

Yesterday Mr. E. Wales, proprietor of the Railway Hotel, Hunstanton, was dangerously wounded in the head by a pistol shot fired by an employee, who afterwards placed the weapon to his head and shot himself dead.

A burglar who was disappointed with the amount of money which he found in a public-house at Johnstone, near Paisley, intimated his resentment by turning on the tap of a whiskey cask and running off £5 worth of spirit.

The Socialist organ, the "Vorwaerts," states that Captain Freilitz, the officer who was dismissed from the Bavarian Army for repeated acts of brutality during the recent Chinese campaign, has entered the Prussian Army with the rank of Captain.

The Hardings of Berry street, Bootle, who gave information to the police which resulted in Goudie's arrest, have received their reward. The Bank of Liverpool has placed to their credit £250, the account being opened in the joint names of husband and wife.
