## THANKSGIVING SERVICES.

A Thanksgiving Service for the recovery of the King will be held at St. Margaret's Church, Westminster, on Sunday morning next. Simultaneously with the ceremony at the Abbey on Saturday morning, there will be a special service at St. Saviour's, Southwark. The Service will be choral, but the music, owing to the unavoidable absence of a large number of the choir on their holidays, will be of a simple character. The Jewish clergy have been recommended by the Chief Rabbi that on Saturday the order of service should be used which he caused to be issued at the time of the postponed Coronation. He also suggests that after the Sermon thanksgiving should be offered for the King's happy recovery.
