UNCLEAN CATTLE WAGONS.

RAILWAY COMPANY PROSECUTED.

Yesterday, in the Northern Police Court, Dublin, before Mr. Mahony, the Great Northern Railway Company was summoned at the suit of the Board of Agriculture for "failing, neglecting, or omitof Agriculture for "failing, neglecting, or omitting to cleanse and disinfect cattle wagons in the manner prescribed by Article 19 of the Asimals' Transit and General Order, '93, after certain animals had been taken from same and before other animals were placed therein." The offence was alleged to have cocurred at Glasslough, Co. Monaghan, on the 20th Jane. In a second summons the defendants were charged with having at the same place neglected to cleanse or disinfect a certain bank or place for the reception of cattle after it had been used by cattle and before ether cattle had been placed there. This offence was alleged to have taken place at Glasslough on the 20th and 21st of June.

Deasy and Kelly from the prisoner's van near Manchester in September, 1867.

FUNERAL OF MISS STUDDERT.

AT RATHKEALE.

The funeral of the above deeply lamented young lady took place on Monday afternoon. The remains were conveyed from Kilkee by steamer te Foynes, and thence by road, to the burial ground at Rathkeale. At each cross-road en route large numbers of mourners, joined the contege, which grew extremely large on its approach to the town. The youth of deceased, her great popularity amongst all classes of the community, together with the painful circumstances under which a young and pramising life was cut short, evoked feelings of heartfelt sympathy. Only a month since deceased was one of the leading figures at the Beachmount fees, in which she took an active part. At the grave-side the last prayers were recited by the Rev. Canon Wills, assisted by the Rev. Dr. McLoan.

At the conclusion of the burial service, the Rev Canon Wills, in addressing the large number of mourners present, paid a most touching tribute to the many good qualities of the deceased. She was, he said, the flower of his parochial garden. He had known her from childhood: At the conclusion of the rev. Canon's address strong men and gallant soldiers who bore the brunt of many a hard fought battle, were moved to tears and many young ladies were removed sobbing from the graveside. The sad scene was one of the most touching ever witnessed in Rathkenle.
