TYPHOID FEVER THE EPIDEMIC.

NO FRESH CASES.

There have been no fresh cases of typhold fever reported in the city during the last three days, so that it may be accepted that the cause of the outbreak has ceased to exist, and that the precautions by the local sanitary officials, under the direction and assistance of the Local Government Inspector, have proved effectual. Before leaving town to day Sir Acheson M'Cullogh held a consultation with the Executive Sanitary Officer and staff, when arrangements were made as to existing and future emergencies. There need, however be no cause for alarm, as the disease is of a mild type, only one death having occurred, and other complications existed in that instance. The Inspector made an exhaustive investigation as regards the origin of the outbreak, as well as a minute inspection of various localities in the city and immediate districts. A report will propably follow as the result of the Inspector's inquiry.

ANALYSIS OF WATER.

In view of the outbreak of typhoid, the Executive Sanitary Officer had two samples of water taken from the reservoirs which supply the city, and with the view of expedition had them analysed by Mr. Thorpe, Limerick. The result shows that the supplies are pure, the analyst's deductions being as follows:—"These figures are not above the average of Limerick city water. Taking into account the fart that the water is peaty, they exhibit no evidence of sewage pollution."

SAD BATHING FATALITY AT KILKEE.

VOUNG LADY DROWNED.

A very sad bathing fatality occurred near the West End, Kilkee, about half-past nine this morning. A young lady, whose name, according to her clothes found in the bathing box, was Miss Studdert, said to be of Rathkeale, who Miss Quinlivan, was staying with Marine Parade, was bathing alone when she suddenly uttered piercing shricks, which brought Mr Tom Falvey, of the Marine Hotel, and Mr O'Callaghan to the scene with all possible speed. They plunged in at once, but before they could reach her she had sunk, and the body had been carried away by the outgoing tide. The Coastguards were rapidly on the water, but all dragging efforts are, up to the present, useless. The lady had only been at Kilkee a day or two, and was said to be an efficient swimmer. It is, therefore, probable that she was seized with a cramp, though the water near the place is very treacherous owing to shifting sands.

A later telegram says-The Coastguards recovered the body, which has been identified as that of a daughter of Mr. Austin Studdert late of Kalrush.
