**LOANS REFUSED.**

A communication was received from the Board of Works refusing the loan of £3,000 for the erection of houses in Frederick street, the grounds for their action being that no satisfactory provision had been made for repayment.

Mr. Donnellan: Have the other loans been granted?

The Town Clerk: No. The Board absolutely refused to grant them.

Alderman McNiece suggested that if it was possible they should transfer the lease obtained from the Harbour Board in favour of a gentleman who was prepared to proceed with the building of houses.

Mr. Gurnane: There is nothing to prevent us making a sub-lease to anyone.

Alderman Daly supported the suggestion. He too was aware that a certain gentleman was ready to build on this ground.

Alderman O'Brien: I don't see why we should wait for twelve months or two years to get this money.

Mr. Leahy thought they should not part with their lease so easily as was suggested. They were not aware whether the new premises proposed to be built would be let at the same rent as those built by Mr. Hayes.

Alderman McNiece said that would be made a condition in the lease.

Mr. Donnellan said to his mind the Treasury had not given a definite refusal to their application, but had merely deferred the grant. They stated that from something they heard—it might be true or it might be false—that they would not grant this money.

The Town Clerk—They state that the rate was insufficient to meet these charges.

Mr. Donnellan said it would be a strange thing if a Government calling itself progressive would stand in the way of a Corporate body like this by refusing money for properly housing the working classes of their city. He contended that the rate was more than sufficient to meet their demands, and that the Board of Works had unlimited security for their money. He suggested that a statement explaining their financial position be sent to the Board of Works.

Mr. Slattery—Do you propose that?

Mr. Donnellan—I do.

Mr. Slattery—Well, I second it, and I do so with pleasure, because it is the first time that Mr. Donnellan has admitted that we were able to meet our debts (laughter).

Mr. Donnellan's resolution was unanimously passed.

With reference to a resolution passed at the Committee recommending that a deputation should wait on the Most Rev. Dr. O'Dwyer, in connection with the proposed erection of artisans dwellings in the vacated areas, the Council appointed the following members for that purpose: the Mayor, Mr. John Guinane and Mr. Ralph Nash.

**VACANCIES IN THE NIGHT WATCH.**

Mr. Long proposed—"That future vacancies on the staff of the night constables be filled by electing one of the supernumeraries to the position." He referred to the fact that at their last meeting an outsider had been elected, although they had another candidate who was acting as supernumerary, and who received the highest recommendation.

Mr. Nash proposed as an amendment that the Council continue to appoint the men as usual.

Mr. Slattery seconded the amendment.

On a poll the resolution was lost by 16 votes to 15.

Mr. Slattery asked the Mayor to vote, but he declined to interfere.

**TECHNICAL EDUCATION COMMITTEE.**

Ald. Daly moved in accordance with notice of motion "That the votes on the election of Technical Education Committee be recounted." He said that if the scrutineers would give him assurance that the name of the voter was attached to the voting paper he would withdraw his notice of motion. Otherwise he would demand a recount as it was perfectly illegal to cast a secret vote in that Council without the suspension of the standing orders.

Alderman Gilligan seconded the amendment.
