**COUNTY COUNCILS AND COURT-
 HOUSES.**

At the County Council to-day, Mr. R. Coll
 J.P., Chairman, presiding, a resolution was re-
 ceived from Kilmallock Rural District Council
 calling on the Limerick County Council "not to
 spend any of the money of the ratepayers of the
 Union on the courthouses of the county until
 such time as it is out of the power of any Dublin
 Castle nominee to deprive the representatives of
 the people of the use of those buildings, on any
 pretext whatever."

Mr. Coleman took it that the resolution was in
 consequence of the scandalous conduct of the
 High Sheriff at Mayo. He proposed the adoption
 of the resolution.

Mr. Ryan, Castle Farm, seconded the resolu-
 tion, and said that as the courthouses were built
 and maintained at the public expense, it was a
 intolerable state of things, to say that the people
 should not be allowed the use of them, and that
 any Dublin Castle nominee could turn them out.

The Chairman thought that under Section 7,
 Sub-Section 3, the Sheriff had no authority
 to put out Councillors, because that Section said
 "except in so far as the Court-house was required
 by the Sheriff or Justices for the administrative
 of justice." Whenever the Justices turned up the
 Council would vacate it for them—they would not
 come there at all. It was a matter of law.

After some further discussion, the Chairman
 remarked that the fact of adopting the resolution
 would not alter the law.

Mr. O'Shaughnessy (Newcastle)—Are we not
 to repair the Court house?

Chairman—Oh, you are.

Mr. Coleman—Certainly not.
 The Chairman said that they were after passing
 a tender for the cleaning of the windows and the
 keeping of the Court-house (laughter).

Mr. Coleman said the resolution would do
 with the future.

The resolution was adopted.
