HINTS TO AMATEURS.

The autumn is the best time to lift Vine roots d re-make the borders. The work is too heavy to it before it is necessary, but when there is a lling off in the produce of the Vines it is time to e what is wrong with the roots, and the bold ourse is generally the best. Those who have had uch to do with Vines under glass do not hesitate Hift the roots and re-make the borders when its ecessity becomes evident.

Vines are hardy, long-suffering plants, and soon ecover from any little injury done to the roots uring renovating operations. If the borders are ride, they need not be all made at once. Six feet f good soil is enough to start with.

Any land that will grow good Wheat and Beans, vill grow good fruit, but for Vine borders take the op fin. from a sheep pasture. When pruning Vines, select a few of the cuttings and lay them in for propagating.

Keep Cactuses and other succulents in the window dry during winter. Fine-foliaged plants, such as Ferns, Palms, and Aspidistras, will require less water; still, when water is necessary, a thorough soaking must be given. When a plant has been allowed to get too dry submerge it in a pail for a time till the six bubbles case to rise. Bubs coming on many lackept moist.

There has been a wonderful autumn bloom of Teacoses. Dr. Grill La France, and the Hybrid Teas have been very fine.

Good drainage is very important for Roses, especially for Teas, as it helps the maturation of the growth, and consequently by hardening the plants makes them less susceptible to injury from a low temperature. There is more in this matter of drainage and its hardening effect upon Tea Roses than what is generally thought. Of course, when the drainage is perfect there must be a considerable denth of good soil, or the plants may suffer from depth of good soil, or the plants may suffer from drought.
