 real name was Lynch, and he had spent two years
 in the Munster Fusiliers, from which he deserted.

It transpired that the uniforms were found in a
 field, but some of the plain clothes had been
 retained.

Defendant was sentenced to three months' im-
 prisonment with hard labour.

**THE SHANNON RECORD
 SALMON.**

Visitors to the Cook Exhibition will have an
 opportunity of seeing a model of the 54lbs salmon
 killed at Castleconnell in February last. The
 model which is on view at the stall of Messrs.
 Crotty, the well-known water sports, was lent to
 the Exhibition Committee by Messrs J. Enright
 and Son, of Castleconnell, who supplied the tackle
 used in the capture of the fish. The salmon was
 the heaviest taken with rod and line on the
 Shannon, weighed 54lbs, and measured 50 inches
 in length and 30 inches in girth.

SAD DROWNING FATALITY.

A sad drowning fatality occurred in the city
 last night, the victim being William Riordan,
 aged about 35 years, who was employed by the
 Harbour Commissioners as supernumerary gate-
 man. It appears that about eleven o'clock the
 poor fellow was assisting to transfer a barge,
 being alone in a small boat, when through some
 cause which was not apparent, he fell into
 the water and sank, and he did not again rise to
 the surface. The other employes who were
 engaged in the same work made every effort at
 rescue, and Sergeant Brennan and Constable
 O'Brien, of the Dock station, were punctually
 on the scene, but when the body was recovered
 some minutes afterwards life was found to be
 extinct. The deceased leaves a widow and
 eleven children to mourn his loss.

An inquest was held this afternoon at the
 City Courthouse by Mr. Coroner DeCourcy and
 a jury. Dr. Shanahan, the Harbour Master,
 and Sergeant Beckett were examined. The
 jury returned a verdict of accidental death.
