DEATH OF MR. COLIN BLUE.

Very many old friends in Limerick will regret to hear of the death of Mr. Colin Blue, late of Kilrush, and fourth son of the late Captain Blue, for very many years master of the Lower Shannon Steamship Company's steamer, "Mermaid." The deceased gentleman, who was a young man, was in the earlier portion of his career connected with the drapery trade in Limerick. His demise took place in London on the 16th of September, not long after Mr. Blue's arrival from Capetown.
