APPOINTMENT OF A MIDWIFE.

Mr. Thomas O'Farrell moved that a qualifi  
midwife be appointed for the Clarina district at  
salary of £30 a year. He pointed out the nec-  
sity for such an appointment, alluding to t  
fact that on a recent occasion Dr. O'Brien w  
obliged to requisition the services of a secon  
medical officer, whereas if a competent midw  
were appointed this expense need not be entaile  
He claimed for his district the same accommo-  
tion as existed in other districts.

Mr. Barrington said he understood there v  
some idea amongst local people of augmenti  
the salary and getting a fully qualified train  
nurse.

Mr. O'Farrell—Of course that will be a mat-  
for after consideration. We only want a qualifi  
midwife for the present.

Mr. Lane said that in the Annacotty distr  
they had got a midwife at a salary of £30, and  
thought a similar appointment at the same pr  
should be sufficient for Clarina.

Mr. O'Regan said he considered it would  
well to see how this system was at present wor-  
ing. In the Cooleycasey district a midwife w  
appointed some years ago, and since her appoi-  
ment her services had not been availed of mo-  
than twenty times, while for the last twel  
months she had not been asked to attend on mo-  
than two occasions. He thought it would  
cheaper if the services of a trained nurse w  
requisitioned when necessary.

The Chairman remarked that they would n  
be allowed half the salary of the midwife.
