Doyle (instructed by Mr. J. Doyle) was for plaintiff; and Mr. Phelps (instructed by Mr. Blackall) for the defendants.

In the case in which Mr. George Ryan, builder, applied for revision of an award allowing Patrick Powell 7s. a week for loss of an eye, his Honor fixed the award at 5s. a week, a life provision, intimating that he should dismiss any further application to vary the order. Mr. Phelps (instructed by Mr. Pitt) for claimant. Mr. Lynch (instructed by Mr. Gaffney) for Mr. Ryan.

In the case of Edward Molloy, baker, who sought half wages for six weeks for injury to his hand, from Mr. Stephen Tubridy, his Honor awarded £3 and costs, being half 30s. a week for six weeks. Mr. Lynch (instructed by Mr. McNamar) for plaintiff; and Mr. Gaffney for defendant.
