CIVIL BUSINESS

All Entries of Ordinary Civil Bills, Ejectments, Defences, and other cases to be heard, must be delivered at the Crown and Peace Office, County Court-house, Limerick, either by hand or by post, before the hour of 4 p.m., Two Clear Days, at least (exclusive of Sunday, Christmas Day, St. Stephen's Day and day after St. Stephen's Day, Good Friday, Easter Monday, Whit Monday, and King's Birthday), before the first day of the Sessions in each town, on Requisitions (Form No. 23). The Entries of Ordinary Civil Bills and Defences must be in Alphabetical Order of the Plaintiffs' names.
Stamps for Clerk of Crown and Peace's Fees must

be affixed on Requisitions (Form No. 22), and handed in with Form No. 23. Requisitions for the Entry of cases must be separate from those for Defences, and free from alterations. Entries will not be received after the days above mentioned, except by leave of the

Judge.

Process Officers are prohibited from filling, or causing to be filled, any Civil Bill.

Civil Bills should be given to the Process Officers within a reasonable time before the last day for service at each Sessions, otherwise they will not be held accountable for the service. Complaints against Process Officers will be held immediately before the commencement of the Civil Business, when they must be prepared to produce their Books and account for any unserved Civil Bills. A strict adherence to the General Orders will be enforced; the Plaintiff shall not be entitled to charge the Defendant the Fee allowed by Law to the Plaintiff's Solicitors for drawing or signing the Civil Bill unless the same shall have been actually drawn or signed by a Solicitor, or in his Office.

Defendants can save costs of witnesses in Undefended Cases, or in Defences for time, by giving notice in writing to the Plaintiff or his Solicitor, ad-

mitting the demand.

Persons transmitting through the Post Office all Givil Bills, Notices to Renew, &c., for Service, shall send a Stamped Cover, properly addressed, to enable the Process Officer to return the original Civil Bills, &c., after the service of the same.

Process Officers are required to return immediately after Service all Civil Bills, &c., copies of which have been served by them, to the Suitors or Solicitor who have given to them such Civil Bills, &c., for Service.
