ADMIRAL'S SALUTE TO SIR THOMAS LIPTON.

New York, Thursday.

Sir Thomas Lipton was yesterday accorded an Admiral's salute of thirteen guns by the Police boat.

Pearls to the value of £30,637 were fished from Western Australian waters in 1901. The value of the pearl shells was £95,568. There were 232 vessels at work in the fisheries, employing 1,555 men, of which only 132 were white men.

Vice-Admiral Barrera, who has just died in Nice, was Maritime Prefect at Brest at the time of the wreck of the Drummond Castle. In this capacity he rendered such service in connection with the wreck that Queen Victoria decorated him.

In the course of an interview with a P. Association correspondent at Rome, Card Logue said the visit of his Majesty to the city of Dublin would do much towards helping the Irish people to know and appreciate their King.

A collision took place in the dark hours yesterday morning off the coast of Scilly between H.M.S. "Melampus" and the steam collier "Ruperra," of Cardiff, the latter being struck. All the crew were saved, but they have lost their entire belongings.

Yesterday being the anniversary of the assassination of King Humbert, a Requiem Mass was celebrated in the Pantheon, at which King Victor Emmanuel and Queen Margherita were present. Their Majesties afterwards laid a wreath on the tomb of the late King.

The India Office last night announced proposals for improving the pay and general conditions of the Indian Medical Service. It has been formulated by the Government of India and will be taken into consideration by the Secretary of State for India in Council. It is hoped that the revised terms will be published in September.

In the King's Bench Division yesterday, an application was made to again admit to bail Fox, of Glasson, who had been returned to trial for shooting at and wounding one James Hannon. The Crown consented to his release on one surety of £1,000, and two of £5,000 each, and the judge ordered accordingly.

The Master of the Rolls was applied to Tuesday for an injunction to restrain the Theatre of Varieties, Limited, from using the name "Edison," or "Edison's" as a description of, or in connection with the exhibitor's animated pictures in the Empire Theatre. The defendants submitted to the injunction the payment of £25 damages and costs.

An extraordinary general meeting of shareholders of the Cunard Steamship Company Limited, was held at Liverpool yesterday, when the proposed alteration in the Articles of Association of the company, relating to the vessels of the company's fleet at the service of the Government in certain contingencies, and the payment of an annual subsidy of £150,000, was unanimously agreed to.

An application was made to Mr. Justice Bowen Tuesday in the Bankruptcy Court for a certificate of conformity for Mr. P. A. McHardy, M.P., notwithstanding that the bankrupt's estate had not paid 10s. in the pound. The ground of the application was that the failure to pay 10s. in the pound arose out of circumstances for which the bankrupt was not responsible. Mr. Justice Boyd refused the application.
