THE KING.

The Clerk read a letter from the Kilrush Land and Labour Association asking the Council to give the roads now falling out of contract to direct labour.

A KILKEE CLAIM.

Mr. Corry made an application to widen and deepen the arches of the bridge at Kilkee near the Victoria Hotel to prevent flooding.

Mr. Casey supported the application.

Mr. Pilkington, solicitor, appeared on behalf of some ratepayers in sustaiment of the motion. He handed in a memorial in favour of this necessary work, and a photograph of the place after rain showing the flooding complained of. One man had a couple of pigs drowned as a result of the floods, whilst others had their houses and beds saturated. Mr. Pilkington said the work was necessary, and he estimated the expenditure at £25.

After a protracted discussion, the application was granted by a £20 estimate.

MOODY MANNER'S COMPANY IN "FAUST."

Last night Gounod's celebrated Opera "Faust" was performed at the Theatre Royal by the Moody-Manners's Company which comprises a good combination of artistes. The great work was produced in an excellent manner, and the principal artistes acquitted themselves creditably. Mr. Edgar in the title role sang and acted with much success, his impersonation being characterised by a keen appreciation of the author's ideas, while his vocalism is pleasing and carefully rendered. Mr. George Nelson as "Mephistopheles" gave a clever assumption of the role, and his singing and acting were received with appreciative enthusiasm. Miss Lily Moody as "Siebel" was good, and her singing of the "Jewel" Song was earnest and well illustrated. As "Marguerite" Miss Enriquetta Chrichton portrayed the part faithfully. Mr. Walter Barrett acted the part of "Valentine" very intelligently, and Miss P. Gilandont as "Martha" was successful. The choruses were an excellent feature in the performance, being very powerful and steadily rendered, while the orchestration were very good. An interesting little Press gathering took place on Saturday night, when the members of the literary staffs of the Dublin "Daily Express" and "Dublin Evening Mail" entertained Mr. Hugh Curran, sub-editor of the "Daily Express" (and formerly editor of the "Munster News") to dinner at the Four Courts Hotel, Dublin, in celebration of his recent marriage. Twenty-one members of the staff were present, the chair being taken by the Editor of the "Express." Several complimentary speeches were made, and the occasion was availed of to present Mr. Curran with a handsome gold watch, suitably inscribed, as a souvenir of the occasion, the presentation being made by the editor of the "Evening Mail." FATAL QUARRY ACCIDENT.

A man named Thomas Bridgeman, who was employed as a quarryman, near Pennywell, about nine days ago died at Barrington's Hospital to-day. It appeared that he was employed with some others drawing a charge when an accident occurred. Bridgeman received some injuries, but they were not serious. He was removed to hospital, where tetanus subsequently set in, with the result that death took place to-day. The police communicated the facts to the Coroner, who did not deem it necessary to hold an inquest.

DEATH OF MR. DOHERTY, KILKEE.

Limerick people will deeply regret to hear of the death of an old and highly esteemed Kilkee gentleman, Mr. Wm. Doherty, who passed away at his residence, Doherty Terrace, on Saturday last. Mr. Doherty, who had attained the ripe age of 77 years, was a native of Adare, but for some thing like half a century he has been resident at Kilkee, carrying on an extensive general business in the West End. Though a man of a retiring disposition he took a deep and practical interest in the welfare of "The Brighton of the west." He erected considerable property, and it may be added that some years ago he generously gave the site free for the new Methodist Church, which is situated near his residence. He was himself a member of the Church of Ireland, and for very many years filled various offices in connection with the Kilkee church. His death removes a familiar personality, not alone to the regret of the townspeople, but to all who are in the habit of sojourning each season at this popular watering place. The funeral took place to-day and was very largely attended.
