SAD RAILWAY FATALITY.

Another sad accident occurred at the Limerick Railway Terminus, near the Foynes Signal Box. It appears that a man named Timothy Galvin, Permanent Way Inspector, in the employment of the G. S. & W. Railway, went for a walk up the line, and got run over by the Kerry train, which arrives in Limerick at 9.18 o'clock. The guard of the train having reported the matter at the station, Detective Constable Neiland and some others went to the place where the unfortunate man lay. Dr. Laird and the Rev. Father Hogan were at once sent for, but the poor fellow died shortly after the arrival of the former. The d ceased who lived with his sister in Limerick, was unmarried, and aged 37 years. Much sympathy is felt for his sister and relatives in their sad bereavement.

THE INQUEST.

Yesterday evening Mr. Coroner DeCoursey held an inquiry into the circumstances touching the death of the deceased. It was shown that he was always a steady and temperate man, but that his mind appeared to be a little unhinged lately.

The jury returned a verdict that death was due to concussion of the brain and shock, caused by being accidentally knocked down while crossing the line by the engine.

R. I. C. MAN KILLED.

A deplorable accident occurred at Ballingarry last night, by which a respectable R.I.C. pensioner named Mr. Hugh Towers, aged 75 years met an awful death. He was engaged repairing the roof of one of the three-storey houses on Mr. Atkinson's town property, when he fell about 40 feet, and was dashed against a dividing low wall on the yard below. Death was instantaneous. The deceased was a most useful man, and enjoyed much respect amongst the people. Great sympathy is expressed for his bereaved sister, Mrs. Stritch, with whom he lived very happily.
