### ACCIDENT ON THE LAHINCH GOLF LINKS.

A remarkable accident occurred on Saturday afternoon on the Lahinch Golf Links. During the course of the play a man was noticed crossing the links, and was warned off. A few minutes, subsequently, it was seen that the man had been struck apparently by a golf ball. On inquiry, this was found to be the case, as he had been struck full on the eye by a ball driven with full force. The injuries to the optic are believed to be most serious, and the injured man proceeded to Dublin by the mail train last evening, for special treatment in one of the hospitals.

### A TERRIBLE JUMP.

There was a painful sensation at Lahinch on Friday, when the news spread that a well-known resident, Mr. McCormack, for some years the esteemed teacher of the local National School, had sustained terrible injuries under melancholy circumstances. Mr. McCormack had been complaining for some time and had been somewhat eccentric in his manner, his friends, as a consequence, having had him under observation for a period. He returned home a few days ago, and on Friday some relatives paid him a visit. Mr. McCormack seemed to have formed the idea that they were concerting steps to place him under restraint, and he succeeded in leaving the house unobserved, making for the coastline. He was instantly missed, and his friends hurried after him. Before they could come up to him, he had reached the cliffs near Moy, and here he was seen to jump from the top of the cliff, which at the point is close on a hundred feet high. When picked up at the bottom he was quite unconscious, and bleeding from terrible wounds on the upper part of the face and head. Dr. O'Dwyer was quickly in attendance on the poor man, and, marvellous to say, not a single limb had been broken by that terrible fall. The theory which seems to obtain credence is that the victim fell on a ledge some distance down the face of the cliff, and rolled thence to the bottom. The escape from an instant and awful death was, indeed, miraculous. At the time of writing, the sufferer was progressing well, and is expected to live. General sympathy is felt with Mrs. McCormack's family, who are much respected in the district.

### DEATH OF MR. M. GILLIGAN.

We regret to record the death of a well-known and most popular citizen, Mr. Michael Gilligan, which took place on Saturday morning, at the advanced age of 85 years. The deceased was well known throughout the South of Ireland, and his demise has been heard of with deep regret by a wide circle of friends. The funeral, which took place on Sunday afternoon from St. Michael's R.C. Church to Mount St. Lawrence Cemetery, was of very large proportions; the Mayor, several members of the Corporation, and a large body of the general public being present. The clergy present were Rev.
