SUDDEN DEATH AT KILFINANE.

About half-past nine p.m. on Sunday night, a domestic servant, nineteen years of age, named Mary Brazzell, of Kilfinane, fell on the footpath near Mrs. O'Dwyer's public house, where she was employed for the past few months. She was lifted immediately by Messrs. Thomas Connery and Dwyer, who found her to be unconscious. She was then removed to her father's residence, which was close by, and attended by Dr. Connery, who was just passing at the time, who did all he could, but all medical power could not restore her to consciousness. She died twenty minutes later. The doctor stated that death was due to apoplexy. Rev. P. Lee, C.C., Kilfinane, was also in attendance on her, and administered the last rites of her church. Deceased was in the best of health and spirits on Sunday, and accompanied the Mitchellstown Fife and Drum Band, which played through the town on its way home from Kilmallock fete that evening. Coroner Clery, Kilmallock, has been communicated with, but does not consider an inquest necessary under the circumstances. The greatest sympathy is felt for the family of deceased in their sad bereavement. The funeral took place this afternoon at the Abbey.
