

104 champagne bottles, filled with powder, enveloped with musket balls, covered with canvas; 42,000 rounds of musket ball cartridges, tied up in parcels of 20 each, and 4 flints attached to each parcel; one scalding ladder complete; 156 grappling irons for sealing ladders; 2½ bushels of musket balls (about 150,000), tied up in four each, being charges for 12 pounder buskies; 14 quires of cartridge paper, 2 deal cases of sky rockets and other signals, a box of tin tubes for the hand grenades; 495 books, chisels, etc.; 48 quires of the proclamation of the Provisional Government; 1 large bench vice; 108 cartridge formers; 1 piece of green cloth; 1 saw, 2 planes, an old desk, with several interesting memorandums in it.

The above is an exact return of what was delivered into his Majesty's stores at the Royal Barracks. Of course this does not include the vast pikes, nor the rebel standards uniforms, bread, newly baked, porter, etc.

Gunpowder made up in a long hand-roll (like a sausage) for placing under walls and buildings, to blow them up, and the pikes mounted to upwards of seventeen thousand. They were of simple form and workmanship, and were broken up by the soldiery, it not being deemed necessary to deposit them in the stores.

HUMANE SOCIETY AWARD TO A CLARE CONSTABLE.

The certificate of the Royal Humane Society was presented yesterday to Constable Michael Farrell Miltownmalbay, Co. Clare, by County Inspector Fausett, in the day room of the Miltownmalbay Barrack, for his prompt and timely first-aid rendered to a farmer's son named Crowe, of Ballyaskin, Miltownmalbay, who lay unconscious for some hours on a river bank at Clonboy.
