Mr. Chamberlain, writing to Mr. H. C. Richards, says—"Northampton is a strong case for our view. The leather and shoe trades are suffering from the dumping, but to prevent this we should have to consider the relative position of the two trades. Both leather and boot manufacturers should be defended against unfair competition.

BREACH OF PROMISE ACTION.

On Saturday in the King's Bench Division, before Mr. Justice Boyd, in the case of Comyn v. Reidy.
Mr. W. M. Whitaker (instructed by Mr. Mont-) applied on behalf of the defendant, Dr. G. L. L., who practices at 344 Commercial Road, London, for an order for discovery of documents. The action was brought by Miss Catherine Comyn, 2 Lower Mallow Street, Limerick, for £5,000 damages for alleged breach of promise of marriage. The defences were a denial that any promise had been made, and a plea that if it was made the defendant was released.
Mr. Justice Boyd granted the application.
